A Message from Our Corporation Board President

The 2013-2014 Fiscal Year is in full swing, and we have recently completed a number of maintenance projects. Planned expenses included installing new fluorescent light ballasts in all remaining fixtures (old style bulbs are no longer available and new bulbs require new ballasts) and installing a motion - activated outside LED light in the Service Entrance. The included "surprise" expenses replacing the garbage disposal (\$1,400), replacing fourteen emergency light batteries (\$356), replacing two emergency lights with LED models (\$90), and repairing the hot water heater booster heater for the dishwasher (\$120). We'll be replacing the light fixtures in both the Living Room (\$700) and Foyer (\$2,000, including installing 2 new ceiling boxes and removing the one existing box). And, during Winter break, the Bar Room floor will be replaced with a beautiful and durable Antigua Brown epoxy floor (\$19,400) {see photos at www.hitechflooring.com].

As part of the plan to focus our efforts to spruce up Acacia's exterior, the exterior stucco was painted and the woodwork was stained (\$20,400). Part of this project included removing all of the old Ethernet and coaxial cable that was attached to the exterior and entered inside. The holes were patched, inside and out. The porch railings were repaired and reinforced and stained to match the trim (\$1,165). Window well covers were fabricated and installed for the Pantry and Laundry Room (\$600). And, the entire house was rewired with new Ethernet cable running through conduit and terminating in wall jacks in all rooms. Where needed, cables for Wireless Access Points were installed in hallways and the Chapter Room. The entire Ethernet Wiring

Project will be paid for from our AFF Funds, so the Corporation will be fully reimbursed for the \$ 15,117 expense. I am happy to report that Acacia has never looked better, inside and out!

To commemorate our successful Capital Campaign (we exceeded our goal of \$345K), a plaque was installed in the Chapter Room with the names and Roll Numbers of all supporters. Please help us raise sufficient funds to take care of the rest of the necessary improvements to Northcote. If each of our Alumni simply pays his annual dues obligation, we'll have no financial problems!"

Please email or call me if you have comments, concerns, suggestions, want to get involved, or simply want to say hello. It would be wonderful if I heard from some of you so I know you are as concerned, yet encouraged, as I am about the future of our beloved Acacia. Also, the Mailbag column was again quite short this time because very few of you sent any news to share! And, only 66 Brothers contributed in 2012-2013. What's up with that?

As I hope you can tell from the articles in this issue of *The Traveler*, the brotherhood has been working hard to improve as a house on all fronts, from programming to house unity. One of the areas of focus within the past few years has been the physical condition of the house. The Centennial Capital Campaign raised over \$350,000, all of which was put into our aging house, which is now over 100 years old. During this period, the Executive Board decided to purchase new couches to replace the Commons and Living Room furniture. However, as money was (as always) tight, a decision was made to purchase inexpensive furniture to last for a short period of time. To no surprise, this furniture is on its last legs.

To meet this need, the Corporation Board and Active Chapter have agreed to purchase new couches for the Commons and Living Room. Given the short lifespan of the current couches, we decided to purchase high-quality, leather furniture of durable construction to last for years to come.

We believe this quality furniture will brighten the commons and make our house an even more beautiful place to live, making them an important asset to our rush efforts.

However, as is the case with anything else, quality is not cheap. The four couches and one love seat that were ordered normally sell for \$5936.98 from Wayfair.com. Using the employee discount Brother de Vries received from work, we were able to get a discount of \$1778.45, leaving a net expense of \$4491.21.

Thank you to those have already donated, and thank you in advance to the rest of you. As of today, a small part of the alumni has generously provided \$716.71. We look forward to hearing from you.

A Brother of Bands

An eight-year-old dream of Brother Alumnus David Fischell becomes a reality with the inauguration of the Fischell Band Center.



It was quite a sight to behold—not in its clean simple lines that housed a 6,400 sq. ft. complex, nor in the deep red that pulsed from the inside of the building, and very likely not in the glass panels reflecting the classic curvature of Schoellkopf Crescent. There was something that had to be experienced to be understood, as you stood before this monument; a testament to a Cornell Acacia Alumni Brother's achievement and pure passion.

Just about eight years ago, Brother Alumnus David Fischell began the arduous process of convincing the Cornell administration that the bands, which are the largest student-run groups on campus, were in dire need of a new home. The old band room in Barton Hall was much too small for rehearsals back in 1971, and there were 110 members. The current count is 200.

Fortunately, there was no better candidate for this task, since Brother Fischell history had а deeply entrenched in Cornell's band scene. He and his future wife, Sarah Thole. both played in the Big Red Band; his brother, Tim, played trumpet there; and his two daughters, Erin and Jennifer, played piccolo and tuba respectively in the marching and pep bands.

All great achievements have their obstacles, and Brother Fischell's came in the form of new regulations surrounding funding in the wake of the 2008 recession. He quickly realized that to build the new Band Center will require fundraising from donations. The lead effort of the fundraising came from the Fischells. !

When the required funds were achieved, a meeting of past and present band members was called to work with the architects to produce designs for the

Center. There were specific requirements: not only did it have to be large enough for storage and offer enough ventilation, this building also had to be, at the same time, sound-proof and sufficiently voluminous. From the Cornell Daily Sun Website, University Architect Gilbert Delgado says: " {The very loud sound pressures from that emanate from а marching band] necessitate a large building volume."

At the dedication ceremony, the glass panels slowly revealed the band who were bursting with excitement to emerge from their new building. The fans, with umbrellas and raincoats, enthusiastically joined in with the band in their rendition of the classic Cornell fight song, "Give My Regards to Davy". The skies were gray, but the Cornellian spirit was loud and almost visible. It was truly moving.

I am proud that I can associate myself with а like Brother Brother Fischell, who has pursued his passion and left a legacy in Cornell University. I believe I speak for every brother when I say that everyone should aspire to turn their dreams into reality, the same way Brother Fischell has.

The Pledge Paddle *o* William E. Ulmer

When Brother Balcerski learned about the availability of an Acacia artifact on eBay, little did he expect it to be as valuable as a pre-war pledge paddle.

The tradition of pledge paddles extends back to the Fraternity earliest Acacia Conclaves in the first decade of the 1900s. Although paddles have long been a part of Cornell Acacia history, I have never seen a paddle constructed before World War II. After a recent acquisition, I am happy to share photographs of what I believe to be the oldest survivina Cornell Acacia pledge paddle.!

The paddle belonged to Brother William E. Ulmer, who pledged Cornell Chapter in June 1925. He was duly initiated on October 24, 1925. What follows are excerpts from the February 1926 edition of the *Traveler:*

> From the region of the Big City comes "Bill," "Doc," or otherwise William Ernest Ulmer, who was born in Portchester on February 9, 1893. Claridon, Ohio, was the scene of the completion of his high school work in 1911. During the Mexican campaign he saw service with the United States Navy and took apart in the landing at Vera Cruz. This was not enough for Bill and when the Big Scrap opened he saw

service on a sub-chaser, a destroyer, and the battleship *Michigan*___Bill entered the Veterinary College of Cornell in February, 1924, and now is in pursuit of the coveted degree of D.VM.

After graduating with his veterinary degree in 1928, Brother Ulmer moved to New York City to work in his chosen profession. He eventually retired to Dutchess County, New York, where he joined Chapter Eternal on September 1, 1966.

The paddle itself measures 26 inches long by 3.5 inches wide. The material is a lighter wood,

perhaps spruce. The design on the front of the paddle includes many elements that still adorn paddles. fraternity The abbreviated name (Wm. E. Ulmer) is printed in well spaced block letters. The fraternity name (Acacia) is at the top. No mention of Cornell Chapter is evident. Finally, the year of his initiation (1925) is featured at bottom, flanked the by isosceles triangles.

the back of On the paddle, there are twenty-five signatures, a feature that I have never before seen. The signatures are separated into three sections: in the first section, six signatures from the October 1925 initiates (Brothers Cotner, Bolles, Rehmeyer, Noonburg, Huttar, and Nash); in the second are the signatures of s ome of t he ac t ive s and alumni brothers from that

(Brothers Lothers, era Bradley, Frederick, Jones, Larsen, Showacre Bogan, Agel, Campbell, Boyles, Thompson, Ball, Cole, Marble, Norton, Britton, and Adams); and in the third section, two signatures from December 1925 initiates (Brothers Riley and Gaines). Notably, Dr. Edward C. Showacre was the father of Brother Alumnus James C. "Doc" Showacre, who was at the chapter's honored Centennial+5 event in August

2012. Brother Showacre's portrait now hangs next to that of Robert Claud "Doc" Bradley, who also signed the back of the paddle.!

Judging from the hole drilled in the handle, the paddle likely once hung on a wall, possibly in the chapter house. Of course, in Brother Ulmer's day, the house at 318 Highland Road was not the chapter's house; instead, he knew the house at 614 East Buffalo Street as home.

I want to thank Brother Alumnus David Klesh for alerting me to the paddle's availability through auction on eBay. Since obtaining this historic Acacia artifact, I have returned it to the chapter house, where I hope it will one day be displayed with other outstanding examples Cornell from Acacians.


