Message from Our Corporation Board President

The 2018-2019 Fiscal Academic Year is in full swing. Some notable events that have occurred since the Spring 2018 Traveler was printed include removing five spruce trees in the Service Entrance area (\$2,376) that posed a danger of falling on the house. In August, the 12 year-old Kenmore washers and dryers were replaced with Electrolux appliances at a cost of \$3,865 (about the same cost as the old Kenmore appliances). The Commons now has two new end tables and the Living Room has a new matching coffee table (which matches the tables in the Commons). Technologist Greg Schultz 2019 (1211) and I installed two Ethernet switches and configured and installed six new wireless routers throughout Northcote to provide complete and secure wireless internet connectivity. Everything we did was documented on a Google drive to make future changes and troubleshooting much easier. Cornell Acacia was reimbursed for the purchases (\$1,036) by a grant from Acacia Fraternity Foundation (AFF)

The Corporation Board has intentionally put some maintenance projects on the back burner in order to build up our financial reserves, which were wiped out by, last year's Kitchen Renovation project. However, we will be replacing many of the often-noisy push-pin CFL overhead light fixtures with LED fixtures throughout the house later this Fall. Over Winter Break, we plan on a mini-renovation of the Wing Bathroom, installing new stall panels and replacing what we believe to be the original triple-sink vanity. In the Spring, we expect that the Actives will perform much of the landscaping to revitalize the area where the spruce trees once stood. The hope is to provide an attractive natural barrier between Northcote and our next-door neighbors.

The Active Chapter continues to survive in an ever-changing Greek system at Cornell. There are 18 Actives plus the Chapter Advisor (Jacob Padilla 2017 (1199)) living at Northcote this semester. Two Fall Pledges were just initiated. I remain cautiously optimistic about the future of Acacia and Greek Life at Cornell.

My gratitude for the Corporation Board of Directors who phone in to the monthly Corp Board Meetings on the 2nd Tuesday of each month that Cornell is in session and make my job as President (which I have been doing for over 36 years!) a little bit easier:

Since the massive restructuring of Northcote's internet that was started last semester, Steve Stein and I have continued to improve wifi connectivity throughout the house. Thanks to the Acacia Fraternity Foundation (AFF) grant, we were able to upgrade all six of the house routers, which are now installed and working correctly. We also acquired one new router that has been installed in the Bar Room. A common complaint with social events was the lack of cell service down there, and by configuring the router to utilize a guest network, we were able to safely allow our guests internet access. Each router has been mounted in its respective location with a wooden box, protecting the router itself from any damage. Additionally, we were able to upgrade both the wifi switch in the wing and the 2nd floor office. Each switch feeds connectivity to all the routers in the house, as well as the wired ethernet cables. With an upgraded switch, we've achieved significantly faster speeds across all devices. Finally, Steve and I have re-mapped the switch's ports to each of the wired connections in the Wing and acquired additional ethernet cables. If any active needs a wired connection in their room, they can now hook into any of the 4 ports within their room.

I'd like to greatly thank Steve for his guidance on this endeavor. Being an Information Science major, I never had the opportunity to work in the IT side of technology. It has been a pleasure pulling back the curtain and understanding how wifi works and how to upgrade such a large system as is the case with our beloved Northcote.


Acacia: Black, Gold, and Now Green?

Featured Alumni Article: Preservation of History through Cornellian Yearbooks

When I was an undergraduate (August 2000 – May 2003), the Chapter Room was an infrequently used space, to put it mildly. Now, thanks to the generous donations received from the Centennial Capital Campaign, and from the Acacia Fraternity Foundation, the space has been upgraded to accommodate the needs of the 21st century while still preserving the reminders of our 111 years at Cornell.

Historically, the actives have purchased the annual yearbook (Cornellian) for display in the Chapter Room. Whether this was sporadically forgotten, or whether several volumes were unfortunately “borrowed”, we have a number of missing issues. With a goal of having every volume since our 1907 founding, I have been scouring eBay over the last few years to complete the collection. (Thanks to Brothers Stein and Balcerski for compiling the inventory!)

You may ask why I would choose to direct (part of) my gifts and efforts towards this pursuit, when all available at the Alumni House, among other places on campus. The answer is twofold. First, I want every returning brother to have a readily available copy at Northcote, with the hope that it leads to a rekindling of fraternal ties.
